I saw a meme recently on Facebook. It read, "You don't have to be perfect to be successful. Now repeat that out loud 10 times each day."

How many of us struggle with perfectionism, the desire to do everything right, proper and perfect? It may cause us to be procrastinators, for we find it difficult to begin things, lest we can't finish them to our satisfaction. It may cause us to be cranky, for we become our worst critics over anything and everything. I know that I can be very self-critical from time to time, taking away the joy of trying something new.

I grew up in a home where both of my parents were perfectionists in many areas of their lives. From the carefully crafted weekly letters to their parents, ironed dress shirts, manicured lawns and flower beds, everything had to be "just so." When my mom sewed, she insisted that the inside of an outfit, look as neat and finished as the outside of the outfit. When my dad would make some wood project in his shop, he would work until the finished product was just right. My dad once was doing a chip carving of a rose window in walnut, and gave up on the project that was almost finished, because the chisel slipped and took out too much wood in one small area. He decided then and there to stop chip carving altogether and gave away his tools. The rest of us were saddened by his decision to quit. Growing up, we were instructed on how to properly do many things: properly set a dinner table, and properly fold a napkin. We were expected to properly miter our corners when making our bed. I never did master the art of pulling up a bedspread and tucking it under and around the pillows just so. It was just too hard for me to get the bedspread perfect each and every morning before leaving the bedroom.

Now this striving for excellence has its place in things. I am grateful for the internal push to do my very best in my work and hopefully in my relationships. Other things have gone by the wayside. I use a comforter to cover my sheet and pillows instead of a bedspread. I hardly ever iron, and well, I will pick up the phone to visit with someone, instead of writing a long letter. Trying to keep up with thank you notes, is enough for me these days.

In fact, I like the Amish philosophy best. Did you know that every Amish quilt has a deliberate mistake in it? It is a practical reminder that no human is perfect. Only God is perfect.

During these trying days in which we're living, I think it is appropriate for each of us to ease up on our perfectionism in all areas of our lives. We just can't do everything to our exacting standards these days, and I don't think we should even try. We have the added tasks of mask wearing, hand sanitizing, and social distancing to contend with. We are having to learn new ways to navigate around a grocery store and out in a restaurant, if we're going to restaurants at all. Parents are juggling in-school verses virtual classrooms every day. Our assisted living homes are still closed to the general public. The economy has gone down the tube and unemployment is on the sharp rise. The added stressors are truly enough for anyone.

So, my friends, I'm declaring, at least for myself, a moratorium on perfectionism for now. Let us do what we can manage until the end of each day, without self-incrimination and regret. Let us be grateful for what we can do, and show grace to one another in matters great and small. Who knows, we might eventually become perfect at being imperfect. It is worth a try.

After taking some time to see how traditional school was doing with in-person classes and to review the results of our parent survey, Sunday School in-person classes will tentatively start on Sunday, October 11th. Currently we will be offering an <u>age 3-K class led by Katie Jeurissen, a grade 1-grade 3 class led by</u> <u>Sarah Lehman and a grade 4 - grade 8 class led by Susan Hirst</u>. We will also continue to need helpers for each class to meet safe sanctuary guidelines. Contact Sarah if interested in helping.

We will be following social distancing guidelines. The age 3-K class and the grade 1-grade 3 class will be held downstairs in Wesley Hall. The grade 4 - grade 8 class will be held upstairs. Masks are required for both kids and teachers/helpers. If traditional school has to stop in-person classes, Sunday School will also stop in-person classes.

On **Sunday**, **October 25th**, the Sunday School kids can come dressed up in their Halloween costumes (family friendly costumes please - no gore/no blood). We will be having an indoor "table -n- treat parade" after the main church service dismissal. If you want to stay and watch the kids, please remain seated in your pew seat.

You may be asking how does a "table- n- treat parade" event work? We will have socially distanced tables strategically placed around the sanctuary. The treats (individually packaged candy/snacks, non-candy itemsi.e. Halloween party favors-pencils, erasers, etc.) will already be spread out on the tables. The kids/family groups will come up/down from their Sunday School classes to the Parker St. entrance, then turn right and go around the sanctuary, stopping at each table, pick out an item, move on to the next table, complete the circular circuit and exit via the Parker St. door.

If you would like to donate candy/non candy items, there will be a collection box in the rotunda so you can drop it off on your way out of church thru Sunday, October 18th.

We are going to try our hand at Apple Pie Making at Asbury. On **Thursday, October 22nd**, a small crew of volunteers will: peel and slice up apples, make pie crust, roll out the pastry, fill the pies which will be topped with a crunchy streusel, bake them and then prepare them for **sale on Saturday morning, October 24th**.



We will be making 10-inch pies and selling them for **\$12 each**. Our plan is to make 40 pies for our first attempt.

We are looking for volunteers to help with this endeavor. Are you a master peeler? Do you have skills at making pie crust and/or rolling out the crust? Can you measure ingredients? Are you able to provide general levity, always a valued contribution?

Our best guess is that we will meet at the church kitchen at 9:30 a.m. and finish by 2 p.m. We'll be peeling, coring and slicing 3 bushels of apples along with the actual pie making steps. Who Needs a Flu Vaccine and When?

Getting a flu vaccine is more important than ever during 2020-2021 to protect yourself and the people around you from flu, and to help reduce the strain on healthcare systems responding to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Who should get vaccinated this season?

Everyone 6 months and older should get a flu vaccine every season with rare exceptions. Vaccination is particularly important for people who are at high risk of serious complications from influenza. People at High Risk of Developing Flu-Related Complications has a full list of age and health factors that confer increased risk.

Flu vaccination has important benefits. It can reduce flu illnesses, doctors' visits, and missed work and school due to flu, as well as prevent flu-related hospitalizations and deaths.

Different flu vaccines are approved for use in different groups of people.

- There are flu shots approved for use in <u>children as young as 6 months old</u> and flu shots approved for use in <u>adults 65 years and older</u>.
- Flu shots also are recommended and approved for use in **<u>pregnant women</u>** and people with certain chronic health conditions.
- The nasal spray flu vaccine is approved for use in non-pregnant individuals who are 2 years through 49 years of age. People with some certain medical conditions <u>should not receive</u> <u>the nasal spray flu vaccine</u>.

There are <u>many vaccine options</u> to choose from. CDC does not recommend one flu vaccine over another. The most important thing is for all people 6 months of age and older to get a flu vaccine every year. If you have questions about which flu vaccine to get, talk to your doctor or other healthcare professional.

Who Should Not Receive a Flu Shot?

Factors that can determine a person's suitability for vaccination, or vaccination with a particular vaccine, include a person's age, health (current and past) and any relevant allergy.

People with egg allergies can receive any licensed, recommended age-appropriate influenza vaccine (IIV, RIV4, or LAIV4) that is otherwise appropriate. People who have a history of severe egg allergy (those who have had any symptom other than hives after exposure to egg) should be vaccinated in a medical setting, supervised by a health care provider who is able to recognize and manage severe allergic reactions. Two completely egg-free (ovalbumin-free) flu vaccine options are available: quadrivalent recombinant vaccine and quadrivalent cell-based vaccine.

Get vaccinated before flu season starts

It takes about two weeks after vaccination for antibodies that protect against flu to develop in the body. When should I get vaccinated? You should get a flu vaccine before flu viruses begins spreading in your community, since it takes about two weeks after vaccination for antibodies to develop in the body and provide protection against flu. Make plans to get vaccinated early in fall, before flu season begins. CDC recommends that people get a flu vaccine by the end of October. However, getting vaccinated early (for example, in July or August) is likely to be associated with reduced protection against flu infection later in the flu season, particularly among older adults. Vaccination should continue to be offered throughout the flu season, even into January or later. Children who need two doses of vaccine to be protected should start the vaccination process sooner, because the two doses must be given at least four weeks apart. Digital Resources

PROGRESS REPORT ON ROOF/TOWER PROJECT

This is being written on 9/19/20. The scaffolding has started to be removed. This will be done in stages as our roofing contractor (RSI) needs to work on the corners of the tower while a portion of the scaffolding remains in place. This project has been full of surprises on a weekly, if not daily, basis. I will share the two most recent.

RSI removed the built-up roofing on each of the four corners at the top of the square tower. Three were okay and have been re-roofed. The fourth corner showed evidence of some damaged wood/ beam due to water. We will meet with people from Capital Construction on 9/21 to determine how to repair this before re-roofing.

RSI, using their 80 foot lift, has examined our tall yellow brick chimney. This original structure was built when the church was constructed and a coal fired boiler was used for heat. We now use natural gas and a different boiler and do not need the height of our chimney. Most of the mortar is gone at the top of the chimney and is at risk to start dropping brick on our new roof! We are now in the process of determining the cost of removing 10 or 20 feet of the stack. Neither the height nor the diameter is now needed or desirable. A shorter stack can be capped and a much smaller discharge exhaust pipe used. The brick at the lower levels are sound and the mortar is okay.

We will soon know the cost of these two additions to our project. Both of these items will benefit Asbury as we move into the future. These and other surprises have added to the final cost of our work. This is the first major up-grade on this building in over 100 years. We expected to find some unknown problems when we started.

The page entitled "Preserving a North Country Treasure" has been created to send out to members of the community with the hope of generating some support. Many of our church family members have already pledged and contributed to see the goal of this project succeed. We are including this in the newsletter so you will have the information if someone outside of Asbury mentions the work we have accomplished and would like to be a part of it.

Talk with a United Methodist Missionary

Connie Wieck, Thursday, October 22, at 7:00 p.m. by Zoom. Connie is currently serving as an Amity Foundation English language teacher in Luzhou Vocational and Technical College in mainland China. She returned to America in January for her Chinese New Year holidays and to help her mother move to a smaller house. And then COVID 19.... She has been serving with the General Board of Global Ministries for 30 years in Asia. In her current assignment she teaches 1st, 2nd, and 3rd year English Education majors (420 students) in oral skills, culture classes and teaching methods. China now requires English language study in junior high, high school, colleges and universities.





Connie had planned to be in the US for one month before returning to China for the spring semester. As the virus spread, airlines across the globe began canceling flights. China next blocked all foreigners from entering the country as the Chinese government worked tirelessly to contain the virus. China is back to before - Covid lifestyle. Even church services are held with congregations of 300 - 400 in worship. China has put a halt on foreign teachers re-entering the country and bringing the virus back with them. America is still on the "ban" list. Connie is hopeful of returning for spring 2021.

In the meantime she is assigned as the Mission Advocate for the North Central Jurisdiction (seven states) of the United Methodist Church. This means that she will be advocating for both national and global missions virtually through UM conferences, districts, local churches and people like Asbury United Methodist Women.
