Risks

Some people love them. Others avoid them as much as possible. There are risks I would never, ever take: gambling with my retirement; bungie jumping; sky diving; to name a few. Risk takers, or dare devils are a breed unto themselves. I remember as a youth watching Evil Knieval, a motorcyclist, who took tremendous risks, jumping huge rows of cars, trucks, expansive canyons, each attempt being more daring than the one before. My younger brother tried to do stunts of his own on a bicycle, using church property as his base of operations. (I bet the Trustees loved that!!). I remember one time when he took a big spill and someone who watched it happened called the rescue squad. When they arrived, someone asked, "Whose kid is this?!" My father had to admit that the child was his.

Some risks are unavoidable. We find ourselves in a place where we have to choose one direction or another. We hope that the risk taken is going to arrive at a good place, but we don't know that at the time of choosing. We hope. We pray.

This season of Lent, I'm doing a sermon series on some of the risks that Jesus took during the last week of his life, a season we call Holy Week or Passion Week. It begins on Palm Sunday and continues until the crucifixion and burial. In fact, the week doesn't end until Easter morning. Here are some of the risks that Jesus took.

- Jesus risked his reputation. He was understood as a teacher, preacher and miracle worker. With his entry
 into Jerusalem, he symbolized for those who would notice, that he was also the Messiah, the one who
 would save Israel.
- Jesus risked showing righteous anger. We like the loving Jesus that welcomes children to sit on his knee.
 We are uncomfortable with an angry Jesus, but Jesus did show his anger when he needed to.
- Jesus risked being challenged. Even though Jesus spoke with authority, his authority was often questioned and challenged before a listening crowd. One clumsy response would be fatal to his following.
- Jesus risked rejection. He cared for others and allowed others to care for him in unconventional ways.
- Jesus risked the loss of friends. At the last supper he pointedly shared that one of his friends, would betray him and that another would deny him because he knew it would happen.
- Jesus risked temptation. Temptations were the bookends of Jesus' ministry. At the beginning and at the end, he dealt with desires to exert his power as the Son of God.

My hope is that in exploring the risks that Jesus took to be faithful to himself and to God, that we can delve deeper into our own spiritual risk-taking in being faithful followers of our Savior. I hope you will join me each Sunday, in person or by livestreaming, as we explore this series.

2 C. Pretzels

2 C. Chex Mix (Mixed 3 Brands Best)

1 C. raisins or craisins

1 C. mixed salted nuts

For Jesus died and was buried three days, Then Easter morning, he was raised.


So when we die, we can live again. Jesus gave new life to all God's children.

From Our Assistant to the Pastor - Max Bovee

Please be sure to obtain a brochure listing all activities planned by your Assistant Pastor for 2021. They may be obtained from the Welcome Center or from the church office. Many special events are scheduled from May-December, Max's 20th and final year at Asbury.









The painting and repair work has started in the front of the sanctuary and will move toward the rear. There is a lot of damage and work to be done. The last time the ceiling has been fully examined, repaired and painted was 1989. We do not have to paint everything, but many areas need attention.

We will be using funds from our Capital Campaign as well as some funds assigned to the Trustees in our 2021 budget for Maintenance and Repairs. Some funding generated by our Endowment Fund will also be necessary. I expect the total cost of repair and repainting the sanctuary and rotunda ceiling will be in the range of \$50,000 to \$60,000.

The Capital Campaign is due to end May 31, 2021. We have two important projects to complete. One is the paint & repair inside church. The second is the need to re-point some stonework and paint the edge of the roof. At present, we have no contractor or estimate for this second project. Maintaining our support of the Capital Campaign is critical to its success. We are debt-free after accomplishing last year's goals.

One topic discussed at our last Trustees' meeting was the issue of church security. We have experienced times when doors have been left unlocked and also the alarm system has not been set. We have been lucky that nothing has been disturbed. These issues are all a result of our own church members. If you are the last to leave the building, please be sure to lock doors and set the alarm. If someone is still in the building, please remind them it is their responsibility to lock the doors and set the alarm. If you have any questions, please contact Bill Plemons or Glen Snell. We believe most of these incidents happen when people just forget about being responsible for securing the building. Let's work towards the goal of protecting our church home.

"BECAUSE OF YOU....."

Naomi Debbie dreamed of becoming a teacher. But like many women around the world, she has had to settle for work as a street vender, scraping by amid Sierra Leone's dusty, overcrowded markets.

Naomi married young but there was no money for prenatal care. Tragically, her first baby died at the hands of a local birth attendant and her second pregnancy miscarried. Then, an outreach team from the Jaima Health Center, a United Methodist facility focusing on maternal, newborn and child health, visited Naomi's village.

Naomi enrolled in the center's prenatal program. When she developed complications, the staff nursed her through to the birth of a healthy son. "My dream of becoming a mother has come to reality!" she says.

People like us at Asbury, in Watertown, New York, are responsible for this happy ending. We contribute to helping vulnerable women like Naomi benefit from greater health resiliency by contributing to the *mission of the United Methodist Church*.



Maundy Thursday - Thursday before Easter. Commemorates the Last Supper.

Good Friday - Friday before Easter. Most solemn day of the church year. Observes the day Jesus was crucified.

Holy Saturday - Saturday before Easter.

Observes the day Jesus was in the tomb.

This is a day of somber reflection, reflecting on what we'd miss in a world without Jesus!

Easter Sunday - Hallelujah! Christ has risen! This day we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus!
